Listening for the Promise

Weekly Devotional Fourth Sunday in Lent – March 19, 2023

"Jesus said, 'For judgement I came into this world, that those who do not see may see and those who see may become blind." - John 9:39 -

To understand this passage, we must consider its background. Jesus had just healed a man born blind. However, because the Pharisees were threatened by Jesus, they could not acknowledge the goodness of Jesus or the goodness of the miracle that He had just performed. So, when the formerly blind man confessed Jesus as the one who had healed him, the Pharisees kicked him out of the synagogue. In this case, the blind man received his sight, but the Pharisees, who thought that they saw things clearly, were actually blind. Jesus spoke these words against the Pharisees.

This background helps us to understand this passage. Jesus is using physical sight to teach a lesson about spiritual sight. It is the Holy Spirit who opens our eyes to see Jesus, and apart from the Holy Spirit, we are spiritually blind. So, Jesus is saying two things. First, He came to save those who do not know Him by giving them spiritual sight. Second, He came to harden the hearts and blind the eyes of those who use their "pretended" sight to wickedly oppose His kingdom and lead people astray.

Jesus is not saying that He will give non-Christians sight while blinding faithful Christians as part of some random shakeup. Although He certainly gives sight to non-Christians in converting them, he only blinds the blind leaders who use their "pretended" sight to lead others astray. He confirms them in their blindness in the same way that God hardened Pharaoh's heart. Once again, Jesus does not blind faithful Christians. So what happens when Jesus opens our eyes? First, since sin is spiritual blindness, we can't open our own eyes. Jesus does this for us. Second, when Jesus opens our eyes, we see our sinfulness and our need for a savior. Third, we see Jesus as the one who can save us from sin. Finally, we repent of our sin and ask God to forgive us and help us amend our lives. But this process of seeing our sin and repenting of it is not a onetime event. It happens continually throughout our Christian lives and in a concentrated way during the season of Lent. During Lent, Jesus opens our eyes to see our sin so that we might turn to Him for forgiveness and renewal. Jesus gives sight to the blind and sharpens the vision of those who see.

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
