# Listening for the Promise <br> Weekly Devotional First Sunday in Lent - March 5, 2023 <br> "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might through him be saved." - John 3:16-17 

We have heard this passage so many times that it ceases to shock or surprise us. To us its meaning is clear, and we don't need to think about it. And based upon the word "whoever," we think that the passage emphasizes the breadth of God's love. But this is not the case. Although the passage certainly affirms the breadth of God's love, it emphasizes the depth of God's love. This is clear from the words "so" and "world."

Another way of saying that God so loved the world is to say that God loved the world so very much. Here we see that "so" emphasizes the intensity or depth of God's love. In a similar way, "world" also emphasizes the depth of God's love. To see this point, note that "world" may be taken in at least two senses. "World" may refer to all the people in the world (i.e., the whole wide world), or it may refer to the world in its sinful state (i.e., the fallen world). The first sense emphasizes the world's breadth whereas the second sense emphasizes the depth of its fallenness.

Although this passage alludes to the first sense of "world," it is the second sense of "world" that receives the emphasis. After all, it is precisely the depth of the world's fallenness that sets forth the depth of God's love by contrast. God's love is so deep that He gave his only Son, not for a righteous world but for a fallen one! Moreover, God's love is so deep that He gave His Son to save this fallen world, not to condemn it. The depth of the world's fallenness shows us the depth of God's love. During the season of Lent, we confront our sin and struggle against it. In so doing, we quickly realize that we are not only sinful and unclean but also bound in sin and unable to free ourselves. When this reality hits home, we long for the security of God's love. At such times, we should move beyond our complacent understanding of this passage and let its deeper meaning shock us into confidence. Although God's love is certainly broad enough to encompass the world, it is also deep enough to save sinners like us. God so loves the world that He reaches out for us even when we are afraid to seek Him.

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
